Four Commended In Merit Test

Four students at Hilo High School have been awarded Letters of Commendation honoring them for their high performance on the 1967 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT). These Commended students are Dorothy Loo, Leila Nakamura, Sharon Tsugawa and Lucille Yonemori.

They are among 40,000 students in the United States who scored in the upper 2 per cent of those who will graduate from high school in 1968. The Commended students rank just below the 14,000 Semifinalists announced in September by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

This is what John M. Stalaker, president of NMSC, said about the Commended students:

"Although Commended students advance no further in the Merit Scholarship competition, their outstanding record in a nationwide program deserves public recognition. Their significant academic attainment gives promise of continued success in college."

"The Commended students should be encouraged to pursue their education since their intellectual talent represents an important and much needed natural resource. Our nation will benefit from their continuing educational development."

Constitutional Convention

Campus Poll Results Revealed

In conjunction with today's first Constitutional Convention meeting, Mrs. Eleanor Schoen's sixth period American Problems class conducted a survey based on the present Student Body set-up. Polled were 308 students representing a cross section of Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors.

The following are the questions and their responses:

Question 1 . . . The vice-president is the head of the finance committee. Do you approve of this?

Twenty-five per cent of all pollees voted in favor of this question, as they felt the vice-president does not have enough duties. Therefore, he should head the finance committee, as stated in the bylaws of our present Constitution, Article 2, Section 2-B. On the other hand, 68 per cent voted "no," justifying their answer by saying that the treasurer should be chairman since he handles the finances of the Student Association. However, many found that it would be necessary for the vice-president to serve on this committee, with the Vice-Principal in charge of finances serving as head adviser of this committee.

Question 2 . . . Should Class officers and Student Body officers abide by the Constitution?

Ninety-four per cent voted "yes," but commented that the present Constitution is not effective; in fact, meaningless. Many noted that the officers were not familiar with the Constitution and its bylaws and are

Aloha Week Revives Past

The colorful pageantry and tradition of Old Hawaii awaits its annual revival next week when Aloha Week will be celebrated with a special Aloha Day Friday in school, Oct. 27.

The ancient forerunner of Aloha Week was the "Makahiki", which was a time of thanksgiving, pageantry, dance, feasting, and the paying of taxes. It was a four-month long autumn festival during which war and work were forbidden and Lono, god of the earth, reigned supreme.

Hoping to preserve this ancient culture, the first Aloha Week had its beginnings in 1947. The week re-created old Hawaiian life with royal courts, ceremonies, dance festivals, luaus, and other activities portraying Hawaii's colorful past.

The Aloha Week festivals are generally scheduled to extend during different periods in October on the various islands. Hilo makes its bow during the week of Oct. 22-28.

For our island event, girls are urged to wear their brightest muumuus, and boys, their most vivid aloha shirts. Also, wearing leis is really in keeping with the aloha spirit of the day.

Sue Sato Writes From Colombia

Hilo High's exchange student, Sue Sato, has written to her advisor, Mrs. Neryda Bottoms, about her experiences in her "adopted" home in Colombia, since her arrival there in mid-summer. Although originally scheduled to go to Peru, Sue is attending school in Cali, Colombia. The following is her letter:

I arrived in Miami at 4:30 p.m. and we did not leave until 4:30 a.m. There were 74 students going to Colombia.

We stopped in Baranquilla to refuel, but we stayed there longer than we were supposed to. Because of the delay, we spent one night at the Hotel Santafe de Bogota. We all had so much fun! Lilia Castellano took us sightseeing. She was our chaperone.

Bogota is very BIG. The traffic is really scary. They just toot their horns and go. We were very surprised at the amount of food that they ate. We were full after we drank our soup!

I arrived in Cali at 12:00 p.m. I have three sisters and three brothers. My mother is "crazy". Everyone in Colombia is very nice. My oldest sister was an exchange student, so she speaks English. I have a hard time understanding their Spanish (they speak fast), but my family was surprised that I knew so many words. I have conversations with my younger sister, but we both have to speak slowly. The dialogues we had in Spanish really help!!!

I was sick all the way from Honolulu to Cali. But after seeing Colombia and meeting my family, I'd go through everything again. Remember all the trouble we had before I left? Well, it was worth it! I hope we continue to have a student exchange program at HHS. Really, Colombia is great!

I'm sorry I didn't get to talk to you at the airport. I wanted to thank you for everything. You really inspired me to try out for the student exchange program.

The director here said something about paying the school. It was understood that I had to pay any school expense myself, right?

New Construction Being Held Up

Progress on the construction of the new Multi-Purpose building which houses the new cafeteria, has been temporarily held up because of the lack of steel, Mr. Herbert Horiuchi, Vice Principal, reported this week. A new shipment is expected to arrive sometime this month and construction will then resume. The completion date set is the end of February, 1968.

Most of the ground work, which includes the installation of ground electrical wiring, has been completed by Yamada and Sons and Aloha State Electricity.

The Administration would like to extend its appreciation to the students for the cooperation they have shown by not interfering with the construction that has been going on.

According to Mr. Horiuchi, there are three other building projects which are still pending. They include the construction of a new 10 classroom Language Arts building which will be located between the gym and the library; a new band building which will be located in the back of the agricultural area; and a new electricity and electronics building to be located next to the Quonset buildings.

As of now, 75 per cent of the plans have been completed and the construction of these three new phases will begin sometime this year.

Several other building projects are in the phase of being planned, the most important being renovations to the chemistry rooms. Most of the plans have been completed, and word was received on Oct. 6 that the County will be putting up bids for these jobs.

Long Term Study Project Started

The social studies department, despite full six period teaching schedules, has started a long term study project this year. Teachers will spend this year familiarizing themselves with the social science syllabi produced by the curriculum center of the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

Utilizing the inductive "discovery" method of learning, these materials include a different approach to world history, government, economics, and an advanced placement American history course.

Aided by members of the University of Hawaii, Hilo Campus, the department hopes to be ready for experimental implementation and evaluation of the materials in 1968-69, with full implementation in September, 1969.
