Motorcade To Precede Homecoming Game

Next week is Homecoming Week at Hilo High School!

This annual event is scheduled for Nov. 6-11, and a whole series of activities are being planned, such as unannounced programs on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday during the short recesses; a rally on Thursday during the activity period; a bonfire on Friday night; a dance, also on Friday night; a motorcade and the Homecoming game against HPA on Saturday night, Nov. 11, at Hoolulu Park.

The rally on Thursday will honor the Hilo High alumni. The activity period will be from 1:45 to 2:30 p.m.

The bonfire, to be held on Friday night at the Civic grounds, will be followed by a dance, at which time the winners of the Homecoming Court will be announced and introduced. Students are encouraged to bring "bonfire fuel" to add to the lumber that has already been obtained.

The bonfire and jam session will be from 6 to 8 p.m. and the dance and coronation from 8 to 11:30 p.m.

The motorcade, which is scheduled for Saturday night preceding the Homecoming game, will start from the school grounds at 6 p.m. and terminate at the Civic by 7 p.m. The Homecoming game will then start at 7:30 p.m.

And as part of the program, the Viking band will march and perform during the half-time.

The Booster club and the alumni will sit in a section left of the band, while the Homecoming Court will remain in their float and view the game from this position.

"Viking" To Enter TB Press Project

Hilo High's newspaper "The Viking" will participate in the 31st Annual School Press Project to publicize the campaign against tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases. The project is co-sponsored by the National Tuberculosis Association and the Columbia Scholastic Press Association.

The project calls for coverage on tuberculosis, other respiratory diseases, and health careers, in the form of news stories, feature stories, crossword puzzles, cartoons and other art work.

Winners in the State competition are entered in the National contest to compete for Certificates of Honor which are the highest awards given each year.

In the 20 years that it has participated in the contest, "The Viking" has won 18 Certificates of Honor.

Besides the National prize, there is a \$5 cash award to the Big Island winner, to be presented by the Hawaii County TB Association.

John and Lloyd will compete with other nominees from all over the State for this honor to represent Hawaii in the program.

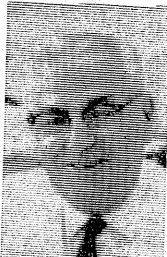
Improvement Seen In Campus Corners

Peace Corps For Malaysia Tour

For quite a few years now, the Peace Corps Practice Teaching Program has been carried out quite successfully at Hilo High School. The present project endeavors to prepare the Peace Corps trainees for their Malaysian assignments.

The Malaysian-bound American representatives come to our campus from Waiuanuenu, Honoumuli and Pepeekeo, three sites used as training centers.

Through their Big Island experiences, which affords a natural transitional environment, the trainees are able to gain understandings of the Southeast Asian people with whom they will be associating later in Malaysia. Very rarely, in their past experience, have these trainees had any kind of involvement whatsoever with Oriental people, such as that which they are having in the local communities.

The initial practice teaching program at HHS, which is in social studies, started on Oct. 16 and will last through Nov. 10. The second group, which is in math and science, began on Oct. 30 and will run until Nov. 22.

We Meet Our Governor

Meeting Governor John A. Burns in person was the privilege granted recently to four "Viking" newswriters through the efforts of Chairman Shunichi Kimura of the County of Hawaii.

Cynthia Agan, Sharon Yamada, Lloyd Matsunami and I were the fortunate ones selected to hold an interview with the Governor during his two-day official visit to the Big Island.

The Governor's message to the Student Body of Hilo High School was:

"It is very important that you make use of the available information and the great latent potential possessed by our people for the prosperity and growth of Hawaii; and that our young people of Hawaii may firmly resolve to develop these latent potentials by absorbing and using the educational opportunities which are afforded to them."

"Also, in choosing whatever you wish to do in your adult lives, you carefully survey all the possibilities that exist or will exist in Hawaii or elsewhere, and study the courses that enable you to go forward. Our Hilo High students possess great latent abilities and have the potential to develop these for the benefit of our State."

The Governor reviewed the possibility of having a four-year University of Hawaii, Hilo Campus, but advised that the Technical School and the University be combined or united, so that the enrollment and demand for such a campus would be justified.

Governor Burns also commented on the feasibility of having a second high school in Hilo. His personal opinion was that one large high school, instead of two small ones, affords better opportunities since a diversity of courses can be offered to develop the latent potentials he mentioned earlier.

However, this question of a second high school should be answered by the Department of Education, he concluded.

We reporters felt honored that the Governor took time out from his busy schedule to grant us an interview. While many important community leaders waited outside in the Board of Supervisors room, the Governor graciously answered our questions and made us feel that we were important too.

We left with a wonderful impression of our tall and distinguished Governor after our close contact with him that one afternoon.

This Is Sight Saving Month

This month is known as Sight Saving Month, which is sponsored annually in the State of Hawaii by the Hawaii Lion's Eye Foundation and the Department of Social Services.

According to present statistics, there are over 800 blind persons in the State now, and by the end of this year, probably 100 more will lose their sight through disease, injury or neglect.

Since half of all blindness is needless and preventable, a much greater emphasis must be placed on preventing blindness, the sponsors explained.

When working at hazardous jobs, one should wear proper eye protection. If there should be an eye accident, these are the three rules to remember: cleanliness; prompt rest for the eye (cover with cold cloth); and medical attention at once by an eye doctor.

Good lighting is important. Whether artificial or natural, light is good only if there is enough, and if it is properly shaded and diffused. Light will be of no use if it flickers, is too weak or too strong, if it is unshaded at the eye level, or causes glare.

In the homes, the television set should not be kept on while the room is completely dark. Too much contrast between light from the screen and the rest of the room may cause eye fatigue. The picture should always be properly adjusted. Sitting too close to the set is also bad.

"Be Wise—Take Care of Your Eyes!" is to be followed during Sight Saving Month in Hawaii.

The next tuberculin testing and Heaf survey at Hilo High School will be held in March, 1968, according to Mrs. Ann Tanouye, health coordinator. Only Sophomores are to be tested.

Last spring, 727 Sophomores participated out of the 756 Sophomores eligible to take the test. Of the 727, all registered negative except for 14 students, who reacted as positive. Later, when these 14 had X-rays taken, not one of them was found to have

active tuberculosis.

Testing was conducted by the Department of Health, with Mrs. Dora Hayashida, public health nurse, in charge.

Mrs. Tanouye stated that special recognition should go to Mrs. Ethel Tsue, Mr. Kazuma Hisanaga, Mr. Choken Maekawa and Mr. Stanley Kawano, physical education instructors at Hilo High School, for their cooperation in the program.

Results Of Campus Poll Revealed

Question 3 . . . Should we set up a student court system, and should the CPO commissioner or the Student Body president serve as judge? If neither, who serves as judge?

Voting in favor of having a student court system were 72 per cent of the pollees with 27 per cent voting against it. Those who answered "no" were afraid of the possible consequences of such a set-up, such as "revenge" and "ruining" of reputations in unwarranted arrests. Other students felt that most students would be inclined to listen to adults rather than to their peers. However, those who voted in favor felt that such a court system would be valuable as a "court of appeals".

A total of 41.2 per cent thought that the CPO commissioner should be judge, but 43.5 per

cent of the pollees thought differently, as they felt that the judiciary should only interpret the laws. Those who felt that the Student Body president should be judge made up 14.6 per cent of the pollees as opposed to the 79.3 per cent who thought otherwise. There were many different opinions as to who should serve as judge. Several suggestions were: an elected individual from the student body; appointment made by CPO; appointment by the president or executive board; or an appointment by the Administration.

Question 4 . . . Is it proper for the president of the Student Body to head the executive board as well as the legislative body?

A total of 35.7 per cent voted "yes"—that it is proper for the president to lead both bodies. Many thought that since our student government is a small group in comparison with our State and National governments, a great deal of check and balance is not needed. These people also felt that too many complications would arise if the president were not the head of both. Those who voted against having the president as head of both bodies made up 61.4 per cent of the pollees. These people felt that there would be no separation of powers or check and balance, with the president commanding too much power.
