### Viks Score 32-2 In Homecoming

With a shower of "blessings" from above, the inspired Viking eleven scored their eighth victory on Nov. 11 against the HPA Kamakanis to climax Homecoming Week 1967. The score was 32-2.  
Hilo started the scoring midway through the first quarter with fullback Bob Ahu ramming the line from the two. The TD climaxed the drive of nine plays, with Ahu going for the first 40 yards for the first play from scrimmage. The 170 pound fullback booted the PAT to make the score 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.  
Quarterback Garrett Kamimura tallied early in the second quarter with a sweep around right end from 21 yards out. The try for PAT was blocked and the score stood 13-0.  
Hilo's Bob Ahu tallied again in the second quarter on a 52 yard run from the first play from scrimmage. Ahu also booted the point after, to close Hilo's scoring in the first half.  
HPA got its lone score on board in the second quarter when Hilo was unsuccessful in moving the ball away from their own goal line and was thrown for a touchback. The score at the half stood 20-2.  
Bernard Jose ripped the field open for nine yards as he crossed the goal line for six points. Try for PAT failed.  
Bob Ahu again hit in the third quarter on a 45 yard romp to promised land, but his bid for PAT failed. This proved to be the final touchdown of the game as the fourth quarter went scoreless.  
Hilo tallied a net 450 yards in total offense and also 14 first downs. HPA had a total of six first downs and 89 yards on total offense.  
The Hilo High Vikings thus concluded their game schedule in the B.I.F. with a perfect 8-0 record.

**Kalani High School—Honolulu**  
Kalani's band hopes to go to California for an 11-day tour during the Christmas vacation. Playing in the annual Rose Bowl parade in Pasadena will be the highlight of their trip; also, they will give concerts at Disneyland and Santa Monica High School.

ipients of these cheery parcels was a Danish-American writer, Jacob Reis, who was so impressed by the Seals that he decided to write a magazine article urging the American people to adopt this same plan.  
\*\*\*  
In the meantime, in the United States, many new hospitals and institutions were being set up, and TB patients who were once thought of as incurable, and doomed, were now being helped.  
However, many hospitals lacked sufficient funds for operation, and one such hospital, in Brandywine, Dela., was even threatened with a shut-down. It was then that one of the doctors there, Joseph Wales, wrote to his cousin, Emily Bissell, and asked for her help in raising funds to save the hospital.  
\*\*\*  
Miss Bissell, who had had experience in fund-raising, remembered the article by Mr. Reis and decided that the Christmas Seal campaign would be just the thing for this money-making campaign. So she set to work immediately on designing the first Christmas Seal, which had a wreath of holly on it, with the words "Merry Christmas" written at the bottom. Also, she had to obtain a loan from her friend for the printing of the Seals which numbered only 50,000 at first.  
Although sales were not very good at first, Miss Bissell kept at it, seeking the aid of a Philadelphia newspaper in publicizing the campaign. The citizens responded to the pleas of the newspaper and soon the campaign grew and grew.  
\*\*\*  
For many years, the Red Cross had supported the Christmas Seal campaign, but in 1920, the National Tuberculosis Association became independent of the Red Cross and adopted the double-barred cross as its own emblem.  
The Christmas Seal itself has come a long way from the first

During the second quarter, Kau tacked its lone score of the day when John Replegie climaxed an eight play 39 yard touchdown drive with a powerful six yard churn up the middle. The Trojans held possession of the pigskin through most of the third quarter, but were held scoreless by a rugged Viking defense.  
The Vikings again stepped on the accelerator in the fourth period and came through with the final score of 24-6.

### "Our Winter Love" Junior Class Dance Set For Dec. 16

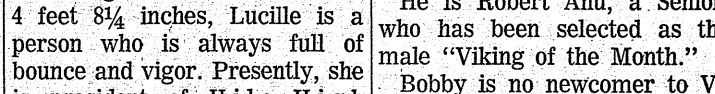

### Winners Named For Motorcade

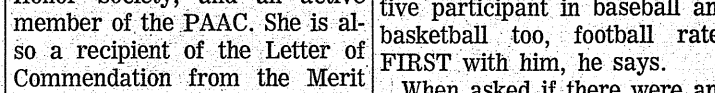
Winners of the Hilo High School Homecoming Motorcade were:

Barranquilla, our first stop in South America, held some surprises for us. Here, we had our first contact with Spanish spoken by native Colombians.

One hour later we were on our way to Bogota. After going through customs, we were told that we would be staying overnight instead of going on to Cali as had been planned.

Our chaperone took us on a brief tour of the city. Bogota is big, cold, and very beautiful. One of the first things we noticed was the traffic.

Although very reluctant to leave Bogota the next morning, we were very anxious to begin our lives as "adopted Colombians".

The car stopped in front of a beautiful two-story house which was to be my home for the next three months.

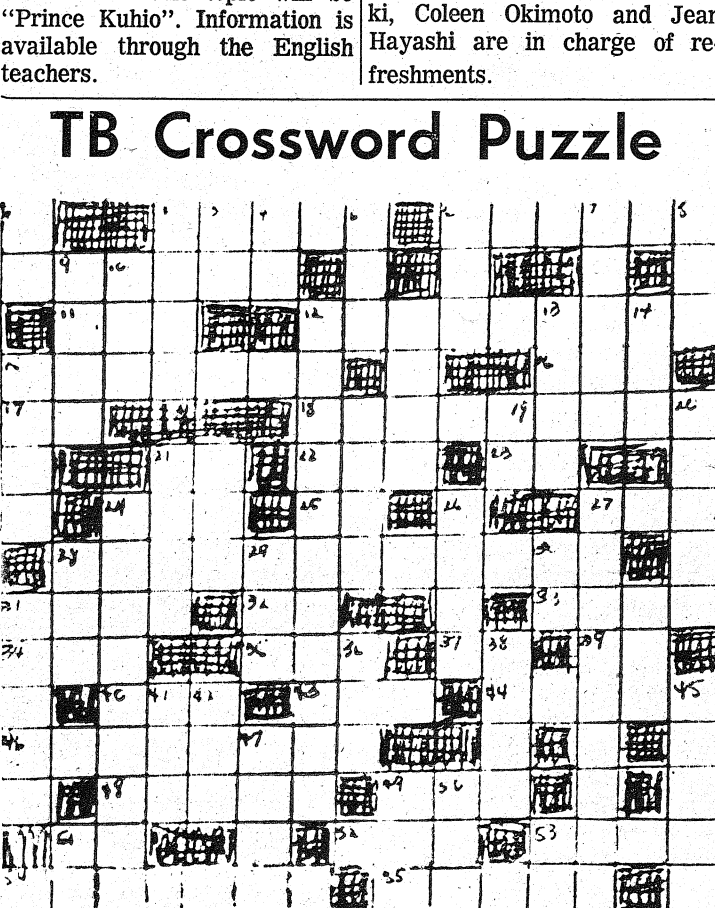
Program To Aid Foreign Students
